

Book Talk by Dr. John Van Atta

Wolf by the Ears: The Missouri Crisis, 1819–1821

rom the early days of the republic, American leaders knew that a ticking time bomb—the question of slavery—lay at the heart of national politics. For a time, an implicit understanding between North and South had helped to keep the



issue at bay: Northern states tacitly agreed to respect the property rights of Southern slaveholders and, in return, Southerners essentially promised to view slaveholding as a practical evil to be dealt with farther down the road. By 1819–1820, westward expansion had brought the matter to a head. As Thomas Jefferson noted, a nation dealing with the politically implacable issue of slavery essentially held a "wolf by the ears." It could neither let go nor hang on without consequences.

Van Atta deftly explains how the Missouri crisis revealed the impact that slavery had on American nation building. He explores the external social, cultural and economic forces that gave the confrontation such urgency and examines the beliefs, assumptions and fears that characterized both sides of the argument. *Wolf by the Ears* provides students in American history with an ideal introduction to the Missouri crisis while offering fresh insights for scholars of the early republic.*

Dr. John Van Atta is the Oaklawn Chair in American History at Brunswick School and a recognized master teacher since 1996. He has published a number of articles on Middle American History (1776–1861) and two earlier books, Securing the West: Politics, Public Lands and the Fate of the Old Republic, 1785–1850 and A Place for Boys: Brunswick School and the Building of Young Men.

A short Q&A session and book signing will follow the lecture, and *Wolf by the Ears* will be available for purchase.

from 5:30-6:30 pm.




